#### Dear Friends,

#### Happy New Year!

This may seem a strange greeting but in schools, in the Methodist Church and in some other places as well, we are transitioning from the old year into the new. Our church treasurers will be beginning the process of comparing their end of year again, various administrative delights will be coming across clergy desks, and after the relative quiet of the summer months the pace of clergy life will begin to pick up.

Change is an interesting phenomenon. One way to exercise some clergy is to ask them to reflect on the merits and demerits of the different systems when it comes to clergy moving appointments. In Methodism, unlike most other denominations, all our clergy move at the same time. We're ready to take up new appointments at the beginning of September. In the meantime, the matching process for clergy moving in 2026 has already begun to kick in. In other Denominations, the search for someone new cannot begin until the old one has disappeared, which means that an interregnum has to occur - whereas in our Methodist system, at any given point each church has a named minister. Change is an interesting thing to manage.

Within the school system, there will be those taking their first tentative steps into formal education, while others look to the joys of GCSE and A Level courses and begin to have to contemplate the question of what might come next. In September, classes and new teachers will encounter each other and a whole new relationship begins. Change comes whether we like it or not.

This is seen in the reality of life; the lives of the people of Gaza have changed beyond recognition since the Israelis began their invasion. When loved ones pass away, everything becomes different. At times change can be brutal, but we do seem to have an adaptability that enables us to cope. So this is not to

forget the impact of experience, but to indicate something of the resilience that people have. We just need to look at the example of the generation that went to war, in which those people were returned to civilian law and participated in the rebuilding of our country and laying the foundations of our modern society.

Some theories suggest that change is good for us, it encourages adaptability, allows new experiences and assists our development as human beings. This of course can be difficult when change is not what we want to do. Often, though, something new, a change, can bring a new excitement to life.

This week my one-year-old granddaughter had her first experience of eating a cherry - eating as many as her mother was prepared to put in front of her! The delight of the new experience, a change, was joyfully evident.

#### Match Report - Studley Wood GC -14 August 2025



Our fifth fixture of the 2025 season was our second visit to Studley Wood GC to the north-west of Oxford, this is a par 73 course over 6358 yards. The course advertises itself as being in a parkland setting with 14 lakes; unfortunately due to all the recent hot weather most of these have currently shrunk to pond stature. The temperature on the day was around 30C and many of the players were noticeably wilting by the end of the round.

All in all, this was an eventful fixture in which I played my part; In getting ready for the event I was packing the car with our golf kit (mine and Jill's) when a neighbour's escaped chickens invaded our drive. I helped said neighbour round up the wayward chickens and duly closed the tailgate of the car, without checking I had actually loaded everything. On arrival, it transpired I had packed most things; except Jill's clubs . Fortunately, Jill was sharing a buggy with Margaret and was able to share her clubs. ## Wild Weedon

The Weedon Wildlife Group aims to protect and promote wildlife in and around Weedon and Hardwick



How many heatwaves make a summer? Hot or not, the absence of rain has certainly had an effect on nature in many ways, and the leaves are dropping early as we head for autumn.

Nature is resilient though and many creatures will be adjusting to the availability of food at this time of year. One knock-on effect has been a shortage of field voles for Barn Owls and as a result they seem to have given nesting a miss this year. Very few boxes across Bucks have had chicks (or even eggs) as the parents realise there isn't enough food out there. In contrast the smaller birds seem to have done well if the number of juvenile Blackbirds, Robins, and Goldfinches in my garden is anything to go by.

Butterflies also seem to have done well in the sunshine with good numbers and varieties being seen. The results of the Big Butterfly Count in July and August should be out soon as Butterfly Conservation experts analyse the data provided by Citizen Scientists (that's folk like YOU) across the land. Indeed it is by recording and reporting your sightings to organisations such as Butterfly Conservation and the British Trust for Ornithology, among others, that the state of wildlife in Britain is assessed and the trends analysed. In the same vein our water monitoring work with the River Thame Conservation Trust adds to this overall picture.



## Gardener's Corner Jobs to do in the garden for September

- Fill any gaps with late-flowering perennials, such as sedums, to provide nectar for pollinating insects into autumn
- Leave sunflower seedheads in place for birds to feed on
- Cut back wisteria whippy growth to five buds from the base of each shoot
- Trim perennials by half in height, even sacrificing the flowers, to strengthen the plant and keep watered through dry period
- Early prune roses and feed to help through dry conditions
- Take down greenhouse shade netting or wash off shading paint by the end of the month, as light levels start to fall
- Pay close attention to greenhouse ventilation, shutting vents on cool nights
- Prune out all the fruited canes of summer raspberries, cutting down to the base, and tie in new canes to supports
- Pull onions as green leaves die back and find a suitable dry place to hang and store
- Cut off trusses of unripe outdoor tomatoes before the weather turns cold, then ripen them indoors
- Lift maincrop potatoes, dry off and store in hessian or paper sacks, in a cool, dark, well-ventilated place
- Pick apples and pears before the wind blows them down, and store undamaged fruit if you can't eat them fresh
- Bring any house plants that you moved outside over summer back indoors, before temperatures start to drop
- Rake thatch from lawns, aerate well-trodden areas by spiking with a garden fork, and re-seed bare patches, once rain is promised
- Clean out water butts and check downpipe fittings in preparation for autumn rains
- Check that tree ties and plant supports are firmly in place, ahead of any autumn gales
