Newsletter from the Social and Community Working Group

September 2009

Dear Weedon Resident

It is now just over a year since we decided to embark on producing a Parish Plan for Weedon. The scope of the Plan was divided into 4 main areas (Environment, Economy, Transport, Social & Community) and groups of volunteer residents have been working on the issues relevant to each area. This newsletter comes to you from the **Social and Community Working Group** to update you on our progress so far and to introduce the next stage.

As most of you will be aware, we have conducted a series of focus groups over the last 7 months, and some of you will have attended one of them. We are grateful to you for sparing the time to come along and discuss issues important to you within the social and community arena.

In general, most people were fairly happy with what Weedon has to offer for their leisure and community needs, but there were many useful development ideas raised. Attached is a summary of the main points from our discussions.

Please do not consider this to be a completed process, however. If there is anything anyone would like to add relating to the issues here, or if anything new comes to mind within the Social and Community subject area, please do not hesitate to contact one of us (details below).

The four Working Groups have also collectively been drafting a questionnaire covering many aspects of life in Weedon considered to be important, upon which **your opinion** is sought. Within the next few weeks the questionnaire will be finalised and distributed to all households in Weedon. We hope to make the process as simple as possible, and everyone who wishes to participate will be allocated a coordinator to help with filling it in.

Thank you for your contribution so far, and for your continued support.

We held five Focus Groups:

Parents of pre-school children Teenagers (12-18 years) Over 60s Parents of school-age children Working-age adults

The main points raised in discussions were:

OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES

The following additional outdoor recreational activities received support:

- Walking (pre-school parents, working age adults, over 60s)
- Tennis (school-age parents, teenagers as a holiday pursuit, working age adults)
- Outdoor table tennis (teenagers)
- Clay pigeon shooting, Golf, Fishing (working age adults)
- Seasonal Gardening Club (working age adults)

The over 60s came up with the idea of reviving the Village Pancake Race.

OUTDOOR FACILITIES

- Finding a piece of land for a Larger Recreational Area popular with pre-school parents (for older toddlers), teenagers and over 60s (for community events). Others (parents of school-age) saw this as a possible nuisance.
- More facilities requested on play area for teenagers sheltered area, picnic/pub style table and bench, outdoor table tennis table
- More equipment requested for younger children baby swing, see-saw, Wendy house, crawling tunnel
- Gate to play area needs to be more secure (parents of pre-school children)
- Replace bark chips with rubber chips
- Request for village roadside benches to be reinstated (over 60s)
- Support for another approach to owner of Lilies tennis court [the owner no longer lives locally] for permission to restore and use this facility, or even to investigate its purchase (teenagers, working age adults)

INDOOR ACTIVITIES

There was a call from the adult age groups for more clubs, particularly for learning new skills/hobbies:

- Investment, Bridge, Chess, Scrapbook, Collecting, Languages
- weekly (card etc.) Games group (over 60s)
- Computer skills
- Dance club, Choir

For the younger residents:

- more Arts and Crafts for pre-school
- Yoga for toddlers
- Art, Drama, Language clubs in the school holidays, maybe in preparation for a show or festival

A "Swap Shop" for Saturdays in the Schoolroom was an idea mooted by the working age adults.

INDOOR FACILITIES

Improvements suggested for the **Schoolroom** were:

- Toilet aids, Baby cups, Child gate, Soft gym mats (pre-school parents)
- better Lighting (working age adults)
- Hearing aid loop (over 60s)
- new Keyboard/Piano (already in hand) and Baffles for better acoustics (adults)
- WiFi facilities (working age adults)

For the Chapel:

a Play area for young children (pre-school parents)

For the Five Elms:

- Several ideas to make this an even better focal point for the village (see Food & Drink)
- a better place for the mobile library to stop?

FOOD AND DRINK

Ideas for additional events/facilities:

- weekly Café at pub
- Coffee/Breakfast available at pub
- monthly(?) Community Breakfast in the Schoolroom
- Themed pub nights
- More Quiz nights

Wine tasting

Cookery courses at pub

WELLBEING

In general most people felt Weedon to be a safe, welcoming village. There was some support for:

- a more organised Babysitting Circle (parents of pre-school and school-age, teenagers keen to provide the service)
- some kind of visiting Mobile Shop/Post Office (over 60s)
- Mobile Sweet Shop (teenagers)
- Directory of trades and/or skills possibly to be posted on the village website
- "Young WVA" to organise more community-based activities/events for under 18s

COMMUNICATION

We looked at four main areas.

Website

- Information on childcare (babysitting etc) could be useful (parents of pre-school and schoolage, teenagers)
- Publicise the website more eg. in the pub. Link to pub website. (parents of school-age, working age adults)
- People to be encouraged to feed in information (parents of school-age)
- Is there a need for a co-ordinator with professional expertise?
- Suggestion to set up a directory on site to recommend tradesmen etc. (see above)
- Online booking system for the Old Schoolroom? (working age adults)

Newsletters

- For newcomers: an up-to-date, detailed information sheet of events, useful telephone numbers, refuse collection times etc. In a format to keep by the phone or on a noticeboard? (working age adults)
- Welcome pack could include information on new clubs, classes eg Art.
- Parish (church) newsletter is important (over 60s)
- Possible quarterly non-church non-Parish-Council newsletter? (a potential coordinator volunteered)

Village diary

Suggested to help avoid clashes of date for functions. To be kept in the Chapel (?)
as this is always open. Likely contributors would need to be informed.

Notice boards

Mostly used by older age-groups

TRANSPORT AND ROAD SAFETY

Although there is a separate Transport Working Group, this subject was brought up in several of the discussions, as it closely affects certain people's social and community activities. There were requests for:

- Better public transport (pre-school parents, teenagers, over 60s)
- Bus service improvements
 - later bus in the evenings (teenagers)
 - o routine bus stop in the village (teenagers)
 - o bus shelter near the park area (teenagers)
 - o direct service to Milton Keynes (teenagers)
 - o low-loader bus on both village bus days (over 60s)
 - better access to timetable (teenagers)
- Traffic calming for both New Road and Aston Abbotts Road (pre-school parents, over 60s)

There was concern by all groups with children/teenagers about the danger for pedestrians crossing the road between the Five Elms and the Park.

I have severe problems with the bus service that is available. It also concerns those who are too voung to drive and older retired people who need the buses as only means of transport. My problem is exacerbated by my knee problem. Waiting for buses in inclement weather adds to the frustration, (These comments were edited by MJN from a very long dissertation)

We used to have a post office & shop but people didn't support it enough except the elderly. It was a meeting place for a chat. It annoys us that people say Weedon is split in two. always has been-not up here & down there. When our children were small we had no play area. They are lucky to have some swings etc. now. Speeding is an issue in Weedon. Traffic calming of some sort would help as long as combines, tractors etc. can get through. Cars parked on bends should be

looked into. If people have drives they should use them. Once in a while is OK but not all the time. I don't complain what people want to do with their property but it does seem unfair when some people get turned down for houses and others double the size

of theirs or build with no

trouble at all.

Fransport: The village is too small to allow regular identity despite its proximity to buses to struggle with narrow roads and tight bends, which are all part and the possibilty of an "Eastern Arc" are a fact of life and are of the village character. So a bus service which would satisfy the needs of the young and car-less would adversely change our control is the preservation of the character of the rural fine balance that currently exists in village - from being tranguil to being busy and suburban. Those who like suburbia tend to live there, and the minority who don't, choose (if they are fortunate) to live in rural villages. The tendency to provide peaceful rural communities with all the facilities of towns and suburbs should be avoided. Maintain the distinction and encourage people to choose one or the other, because a "happy medium" is a dim

unspoilt character and a vibrant community. We are fortunate that the Rural Area Local Plan has categorised Weedon as an Appendix 2 village in which development is restricted to small scale, permitted in-fill and rounding off. It is important that we support this and recognise that exception planning, for whatever reason, can destroy the special quality of a village very quickly. The over-development and very opportunistic development of Hardwick shows just how these developments can change the appearance of a small village very quickly.

Similarly attempts at "social engineering" should be resisted. If villages three times the size of Weedon (eg. Whitchurch/Stewkley) can't support a village shop any longer then the notion that "if Weedon was bigger we could have more facilities" cannot be supported by the facts and realities of rural life in the 21st century. The vast majority of Weedon residents have chosen to live here (and often paid a very substantial premium to do so BECAUSE it is a small rural village and we need to recognise that.

Why not make better use of email? For those who are willing it is an easy & quick way of communicating & getting response. What a shame email addresses were not asked for in this qu'aire. I would be willing to supply a farm shop/community shop with locally baked bakery fare, products etc. At present I have a few customers in Weedon which I supply bread/cakes etc, the first one being Joanna Rose who was my first customer and several more have requested the home delivery service. A leaflet drop is planned for October to promote the service further to Weedon, Hardwick, Aston Abbotts, Whitchurch.

A leaflet about available public transport could be helpful to newcomers to the village (should they have car problems). Also recycling information (which is available already) should be provided. In Germany people are given taxi vouchers to get to the hospital if they are unable to drive.

Weedon is a wonderful village however the large majority of the village have little or no contact with the remainder. This is a common malaise for which I have no remedy. Your efforts are hugely welcomed by us. P.S. If we win the raffle please put it back and draw again Slee





HISTORY with reference annotation

Weedon, an old English word, means "pagan shrine on a hill". The pagan Anglo-Saxons settled in Buckinghamshire from the fifth century onwards, so the name possibly indicates a comparatively late survival of pagan practices. Archaeological surveys have found Neolithic to Bronze Age flints and Roman remains in various parts of the parish suggesting the possibility of a much earlier settlement.²

The Domesday Book

Although Weedon is mentioned in a will dated 944, it is not named in the Domesday Book of 1086, but is included in the three land-holdings listed for Hardwick. The largest of these was *Hardwick Manor* and the second is believed to have been called *Weedon-in-the-Vale Manor* in the 14th century and *Kempton's Fee* in the 16th and 17th centuries. The smallest, on which may have stood a dovecot and windmills, may have become part of the Weedon manor.³

Descent of the manors - origin of the two Weedon "ends"?

Hardwick Manor was inherited by two sisters in 1236 and from that date each half descended separately in ownership. In 1385, New College, Oxford acquired one half, with its base being at *Weedon Lodge*. Until parish boundary changes in 1886, Weedon Lodge, with 8 acres of land, was actually part of Wingrave parish, not Weedon. The College still owns land at Weedon Hill.

The other half-manor was conveyed to Robert Lee of Quarrendon in 1522. A year later, he also acquired the Weedon-in-the-Vale manor. Lilies was the base of the Lees. This arrangement may account for the polyfocal layout of the village, with one centre at East End and the other at the High Street. The two parts are still separated by the field called *The Closes*.

Windmills of Weedon

The mound in Lilies Park beside the Buckingham Road may be all that remains of one of the windmills mentioned above. In 1692, Elizabeth, Countess of Lindsey, of Lilies and her son, Henry, Earl of Litchfield, granted two parcels of land to Leonard Sharp, miller of Aston Abbotts. A substantial windmill was to be built on one parcel, on the site of a former ancient mill, and on the other a little house for the miller. The *Windmill Field* or *Nap* is referred to in several "glebe terriers" (land surveys), including that of 1605, and a windmill is shown on the pre-enclosure map of Weedon, albeit on the opposite side of the main road. The position of the road may have changed, however.⁶

The two Weedon Manors

Each manor held its own manorial court which by the 1700s dealt predominantly with changes of tenants and the collection of monies due to the Lord of the Manor. The Lee manor let a number of farms and cottages, some of the latter with small amounts of land in the open fields and rights of pasture for two cows and six sheep. A few cottages built on the manorial waste, for example in Stockaway, were allowed to remain for a nominal rent.

The "copyhold" system of tenure

New College leased out College Farm (Weedon Lodge) but their remaining land was held by copyhold for 'three lives'. A copyholder retained a copy of the entry made in the manorial court roll. He named two others to succeed him. Properties could stay in the same family for generations as long as they could afford the entry fines due on being admitted to the tenancy and for each life added. Many copyholds had been converted to leasehold during the 18th century, but this form of tenure continued in Weedon until the early 20th century, under the conservative management of New College. *The Chestnuts, Lambsquay House, The Wheatsheaf* and *The Royal George*, all dating from the 17th century, were copyhold properties.⁹

Weedon lands before enclosure

The land of both manors and about 138 acres of non-manorial freehold land lay intermixed in the three large open fields that surrounded the village. These fields were subdivided into named furlongs and each furlong into strips. Each year, one field lay fallow; one grew wheat and the other beans. Pasture was in short supply and the number of animals that could be kept was carefully regulated. There were also some old enclosed fields, for example *Kirby's*, *The Closes* and *Lammas Close*. ¹⁰

Weedon Act of Enclosure 1801

By the 18th century the open field system of farming was seen as inefficient and many parishes enclosed their fields by an act of parliament. The *Weedon Act* authorised the enclosure of allotments, by hedges and ditches, for the sole use of the owner or tenant. New roads were laid out including New Road and the Aston Abbotts Road, and some of the High Street was repositioned.

The *Enclosure Award 1802* allotted 738 acres to New College, 502 acres to the Marquis of Buckingham (who bought the Weedon part of the Lee Manor in 1801) and 302 acres to the Church, in lieu of tithes. ¹¹ Although the layout of Weedon was transformed by enclosure, the ridge and furrow clearly visible in many of the fields is evidence of mediaeval farming practices and has survived due to the conversion to pastoral farming after enclosure.

The village economy after enclosure

Enclosure did not result in mass exodus, but some families emigrated to Australia in the 1840s. ¹² The population rose from 385 in 1801 to 463 in 1871 before dropping to 321 in 1901. ¹³

Agriculture was still the major source of employment with most men working as labourers. Women and children supplemented the family income by straw-plaiting and lace-making, with 93 involved in these crafts in 1851. This figure dropped to 14 in 1881 due to the strong competition from foreign imports. Have women left the village to search for work elsewhere. It was not until the early twentieth century that the crafts of blacksmith, tailor and baker that had made the village fairly self-sufficient disappeared. The last shop closed in 1990.

The three Weedon pubs

For a short while there were three public houses licensed in Weedon. A pub was licensed in 1754 which was probably the *Five Elms*, but the name did not appear until 1777. The *Crown and Wheatsheaf*, later just the *Wheatsheaf*, was licensed from 1815 and closed in the 1950s. The *Horse and Jockey* at Weedon Hill was licensed in 1818, but it only remained a pub for a few years before becoming the Horse and Jockey farm by the 1850s. ¹⁵

Lilies and the Rothschilds in Weedon

In 1848, the Buckinghams were forced to sell their land holdings in and around Aylesbury. Lord Nugent, the first Duke of Buckingham's brother, bought the house and parkland. The remainder of the Weedon estate was purchased by Baron Anthony de Rothschild of Aston Clinton in 1849.¹⁶ On Lord Nugent's death in 1850, Lilies was inherited by Dr Connell, a relative of Nugent's wife.

In 1869, Lilies house and grounds were bought by Henry Cazenove, a stockbroker from London. He had the old house pulled down and rebuilt in 1870.¹⁷ Henry Cazenove died in 1894 and the house was put up for sale. It continued in private hands until 1939, when it was taken over by a firm of distillers. From 1946 it was used as a training centre for the Royal Bucks Hospital, but reverted to private ownership in 1969.¹⁸

Education and schools

Entries in 19th century marriage registers show that many could not sign their name, but a number of attempts had been made to educate at least some of the children. A young woman ran a school in Weedon in 1712. A daily school commenced in 1831, in which twenty boys and girls were instructed at the expense of their parents. A Sunday school supported by voluntary contributions started in the same year. Dr Bridle founded two schools in Hardwick, in the late 18th century, one for boys and one for girls, and set up a trust to finance them. ¹⁹

In 1873 Henry Cazenove of Lilies built an Infants School in Weedon, which commenced operating in November. Cazenove and the Rector shared the running costs. In January 1877, Mrs Cazenove gifted the schoolroom to the village and church services started on Sunday evenings. Mrs Cazenove continued to support the school until her death in 1905, but it is believed that the school closed in that year.²⁰

Churches and chapels

Another important influence on the lives of the villagers was Methodism and the building of the chapels, but they may not have been the first churches in Weedon.

The pre-enclosure map reveals the location of an old churchyard, which is mentioned in the glebe terrier of 1605. It lies partly under the High Street (Cooks Hill) and partly within the grounds of Lilies alongside the public footpath and is now a heavily wooded area. A shaded area on the map, next to the churchyard, may identify the site of a late Saxon

wooden church, built by the then lord of the manor and with sufficient status to acquire burials. It was probably replaced by the more substantial stone building of St Mary's in Hardwick prior to 1066.²¹

In 1772, a house was registered as a Methodist place of worship. It was not intended to replace the established church but aimed at a revival with open air preaching as the point of difference. Another house was licensed in 1813. In 1830, Reverend White recorded the number of people in the Methodist Society as nine.²²

The Religious Census taken in March 1851 records that a Wesleyan chapel was erected in 1833, and a Primitive chapel in 1846. A new Methodist chapel was built in 1854 (still in use) and another Primitive chapel in 1891, but this survived for only a short time.²³

The 20th century

In 1894, local government introduced Parish Councils with councillors 'representing' church, chapel or public house. Street lighting was installed in the form of four oil lamps at strategic places. In the 1930s electricity came to the village but mains water and a sewage system had to wait a further 10 years.

The advent of motor transport made the village much more accessible. Many of the old cottages disappeared, replaced by council houses in the 1920s and a few new homes built by New College for their farm workers. Other housing, both private and council, followed after the Second World War.

Lack of village employment meant that most people commuted to work in Aylesbury, and latterly Milton Keynes and even London.

In the 1960s a plan to build the third London airport at nearby Cublington was defeated by strong local action, saving the rural tranquillity of Weedon village.²⁴
